The Cheshire family of Limekilns, from 1735

Immortalised in the name of Cheshire's Close (probably created in 1808), the four generations of Cheshires who were at Limekiln Farm provide an unusually concise & neat family tree. It is partly because they were not very prolific, & there are no diverging branches of the tree; also, because of the latish age at which they married, the century-&-a-half is covered by just four generations. The fourth generation produced no issue, which is also an unusual way for a family tree to end. The Cheshires illustrate the characteristic of remaining unmarried, or marrying late, in order to work on the family farm, a carry-over of medieval practices that survives in farming families but is otherwise very much against the trend in the industrial era. The final household consisted of sister & brother Hannah & Samuel & three servants; she died just a few months after him, as bereaved spouses often did in traditional society.
